he Foundation is proud to launch a new matching gift campaign with the goal of raising \$100,000 by April 15, 2019 for use by CMC's Low-Cost Effective Care Unit (LCECU). This initiative is made possible through the generosity of Dr. Rob Fish, a member of the Scudder family, who has pledged to match dollar for dollar the first \$50,000 donated in support of the LCECU.

All proceeds from this campaign will be designated to support LCECU's 2019 "Care in the Community" vision which incorporates (1) opening new outreach medical clinics in impoverished areas of Vellore, (2) enhancing educational and training opportunities, (3) strengthening economic development, and (4) improving sanitation – all through increased dialogue and empowerment within each community.

We look forward to collaborating with Dr. Fish and with the medical staff at CMC Vellore on their efforts to bring greater attention and a continued resolution to improving access to quality healthcare for the poor.

## CMC and Tufts Continue Collaborations on Education and Medical Research



On January 14, 2019, CMC Vellore and Tufts University, Boston, renewed a longstanding collaboration on medical research and education at a Presidential Roundtable on International Cooperation in Higher Education held at the Maurya hotel in New

Dehli. Both institutions, represented by CMC Director Dr. J.V. Peter, Principal Anna Pulimood and Tufts Provost ad interim Deborah Kochevar, and Medical School Dean Harris Berman, signed an Agreement of Affiliation to continue the 30-year old partnership.

The agreement ensures the continuation of ongoing programs of exchange and collaboration in areas of interest and benefit to both institutions.

At this event, Dr. Anna Pulimood also participated in a panel discussion on higher education. The following day at Tufts Brookings, India, Dr. Harris Berman and Dr. Honorine Ward, Professor of Medicine at Tufts and Vellore CMC Foundation Board Chair, participated in a panel discussion entitled "Opportunities for India Beyond 2019: The Future of Health and Geopolitics".

## **Diabetic Retinopathy Screening Program**

Diabetes mellitus is still a major public health problem in India. CMC's Department of Ophthalmology is playing an integral role in combating the effects of this disease by setting up ongoing screening, counseling and treatment protocols to manage diabetic retinopathy and its complications. To support CMC and its efforts, FOV Australia, FOV UK and the Vellore CMC Foundation are jointly contributing \$115,000 for the launch of a mobile Diabetic Retinopathy Screening Program to be headed up by the medical staff at Schell Eye Hospital. The program, presented by the Department of Ophthalmology, will provide preventative care for patients who would otherwise suffer from a life of visual disability.



## Celebrating 100 Years of Excellence and Women's Empowerment at CMC!



he Centennial Celebration Gala was held on December 13, 2018 in New York City and raised over \$25,000 to benefit the Mary Verghese Institute of Rehabilitation at the Christian Medical College (CMC) in Vellore, India.

The Gala, sponsored by the Reformed Church in America and the Scudder Association Foundation, brought together members of the CMC alumni association, the Scudder family, the faith-based community, Weill Cornell College of Medicine, and representatives from our various partner organizations to celebrate a century of accomplishments at CMC and to pay tribute to its founder, Ida S. Scudder.

The evening was a celebration of all the remarkable women and men who came through the academic experience created by Ida's visionary mission to provide compassionate, high-quality care for all. Dr. Anna Pulimood was honored for her role as the fifth woman to serve as principal of CMC and for her ongoing efforts to ensure that CMC continues to be one of the best medical education institutions in India. Ms. Chelsea Clinton received the Ida S. Scudder Centennial Woman's Empowerment Award for her commitment to women's causes around the world and for her recognition of Dr. Mary Verghese as one of the most prominent female figures in history, which she did in her children's

## Team Eclectic Goes to Work in the Jawadhi Hills on the Outskirts of Vellore, India



learned about the Jawadhi Hills "model villages" project about two years ago, and reached out to the CMC team to explore whether Team Eclectic could play a role in one of its construction projects. Dr. Anu Rose, the CMC/CHAD "Model Villages" project leader, welcomed the offer and was our main point-of-contact throughout. The people of Jawadhi Hills are primarily tribal folk.

Mark, John and I were the members of Team Eclectic to travel to the Jawadhi Hills, but everyone from the team contributed raising nearly \$13,000 towards the program. We reached Vellore on the evening of December 12th and spent the next three days in the Jawadhi Hills, with Dr. Anu Rose by our side.

#### DAY ONE - IN JAWADHI HILLS IN THE TOWN KOILOOR

We got to work and the one thing that never escapes us during these types of projects, "moving the materials", was the first task at hand. Thankfully, we had a masonry crew helping us out as well. The plan was to construct two sets of toilets – one for the boys and one for the girls. The waste would be routed to a pit.

The housing structure for the toilets was already in place, but the interior



had to be torn down before any construction could begin. The boys toilet side had been cleaned up prior to our arrival, but Mark went to work on the other side with a sledge hammer....and took down the interior single-handedly. I tried my hand at bricklaying – to build single column walls to serve as the separations for the stalls. Nearly 3 hours later, with a lot of help from the professionals and the crew of volunteers, the first set of interior walls were up and we were ready for lunch!

### DAY TWO - VISIT TO VALLITHATHANKOTTAI (MODEL VILLAGE #2)

The houses here were not clustered together and almost every house was located close to where their farmlands were situated. One household lacked a toilet, so there we go! This time, we moved concrete blocks around and most of the time was spent moving the dirt out of the pits as they were dug. We spent 15-20 minutes speaking to the village folk about their perspective on how the "model villages" project was helping them. They were thankful for the toilets,

for the livelihood help provided by Don Bosco, and for the support they were getting for their farming needs. Don Bosco has provided some of the families with cows, chicken and pigs as part of the livelihoods project. They have also helped convert some of their dry ponds into rainwater harvesting facilities, which double up as fish ponds (for consumption).

### **DAY THREE - A VISIT TO** PEENJAMANDHAI VILLAGE. **JAWADHI HILLS**

We visited Peenjamandhai village on day three, which was a 1.5 hour ride on dirt roads that could hardly be called roads. While there isn't a model village effort being undertaken here, the CMC team is working to develop a community health worker model. High each and their task is to enumerate the households (and residents), as well as to keep track of pregnancies, births and deaths in their villages. With this baseline information, the CMC/ CHAD team can target interventions and deliver the appropriate care and educational messaging to these communities. The CMC/CHAD team has a mobile clinic that visits these villages on a scheduled rotational basis - having the baseline information helps optimize the schedule that is followed.

A huge thanks to Dr. Anu Rose and the CHAD team, as well as Fr. Vinodh and the Don Bosco team for giving us this unforgettable opportunity.

## Remembering the Life of Dr. Surjit Hermon Through the Support of Medical Advancements in Radiology at Kannigapuram

During the final weeks of 2018, the Foundation, in collaboration with Manorama Hermon, MD (Batch '67) and an anonymous second donor, initiated a matching gift campaign in memory of Dr. Surjit Hermon (Batch '67), whose life was taken unexpectedly ten years ago. With the goal of raising funds to support the Department of Radiology (located at the soon-to-open Level One Trauma Center in Kannigapur-

am), the campaign was launched with a two-to-one matching gift incentive, where every \$1 donated was matched with a \$2 contribution by Dr. Mano Hermon, Surjit's wife, and her friend.

In concert with an international appeal orchestrated by Hugh Skeil of the Development Office in Vellore, the Foundation broadened its reach to the United Kingdom, Europe, Australia, India, and other countries. The result was the extraordinary accomplishment of raising more than \$90,000 in just over five weeks. Through the generosity of CMC's alumni and friends of Drs. Manorama and Surjit Hermon from around the world, the campaign was a resounding success!

Dr. Surjit Hermon was the Chief of Radiology at CGH Medical Center in Sterling, Illinois during the latter part of his medical career; Dr. Mano Hermon thought it fitting to honor him and his achievements on the tenth anniversary of his passing by supporting the Radiology Department at CMC. A colleague recently commented: "He was the best radiologist I have ever worked with, and a fine gentlemen as well-I really miss not having him around the hospital, in x-ray and in my life." Dr. Hermon's life inspired his family, friends, colleagues, and fellow CMC alumni to give generously in support of Radiology, the Trauma Center and CMC, creating a lasting tribute to his memory.
